

Alice Walker (born February 9, 1944) is an author of short stories and novels, essays and poetry and an activist for racial civil rights, women's equality and peace.

We have a few COVID related options for those who wish to partake. Those who prefer not to partake in Communion are invited to a different kind of divine encounter through an interfaith prayer of blessing. If this is your preference, we invite you to meet the preacher at the baptismal font.
