"When the Wolves Returned" Dorothy Hinshaw Patent

A story of renewal from an unexpected place, adapted for service by Bambi Hamby

Yellowstone is a very special place.

More than a hundred years ago,

America turned Yellowstone into the world's first national park.

For many years, the most important thing was that people enjoy the park.

Because wolves fed on the elk and deer that people liked, hunters were paid to kill the wolves. By 1926 the wolves were all gone.

Safe from wolves, elk became more numerous as the years passed.

Coyotes also increased in numbers, taking over the land and food that other small predators need to survive. The coyotes fed on newborn pronghorn, so every year, fewer pronghorn fawns survived.

Even the trees and shrubs in the park suffered because the wolves were gone.

The beavers that need aspens, cottonwoods, and willows also began to disappear.

Some scientists thought forest fires might fix Yellowstone, but they were wrong.

Scientists finally decided that returning the wolf might help solve the park's problems.

Many people fought the idea of bringing back wolves, but they lost the battle.

When the wolves were brought back, they thrived and multiplied. Wolves chased and killed the coyotes until half of them were gone. With fewer coyotes hunting them, pronghorn and other prey animals survive more easily.

Grizzly bears chase wolves from their kills, helping themselves to quality food.

Wolves on the hunt keep the elk on the move, spreading out their feeding. Young aspens, cottonwoods, and willows can grow again, and the animals that need them are also coming back.

Returning the wolf is helping to make Yellowstone whole again.

VISIO DIVINA STUDENT MINISTER

God speaks to us in many ways-through relationships, our experiences, sacred texts such as the Bible and many more. Visio divina, Latin for divine seeing, is praying with images to listen to God's words. Like lectio divina, Latin for divine reading, Visio divina has four steps.

- 1. You are invited to study the photo that covers today's bulletin-slowly, taking a first glance noting the colors, people, places and things.
- 2. Take a second, deeper, look. Where is there movement? What relationships do you see? Engage your imagination. Where are you in the artwork? What do you see from that perspective? What deeper meaning emerges?

- 3. Respond to the image with prayer. Did the image remind you of an experience, person or issue for which you'd like to offer thanksgiving or intercession? Offer that prayer to God.
- 4. Find your quiet center. Breathe deeply. Relax your shoulders, arms and legs. Rest in this quiet. Let God pray in you. God prays beyond words.
