

RECOGNITION OF RETIREMENT

Presider:

Dr. Thayer and Dr. O'Brien, you have been called to Lancaster Theological Seminary, to serve and minister to students seeking a vocation in church or church-related ministries. In your years of dedicated and passionate service, you brought the wisdom of biblical scholarship, the traditions and practices of Christian church history, the creativity and fullness of the arts in Christian worship and work, and the guidance for spiritual practices provided by our ancestors in the faith. All of these you have done with excellence and extraordinary care.

All:

We thank God for you and your most faithful response to the calling of scholar and educator in this community of students. We have been blessed by your skills and gifts while under your leadership, and have grown in knowledge, being challenged and exhorted toward transformation.

St Minister: Dr. O'Brien, from you the treasures of the Bible were unfolded in ways we had not considered fully before. The world behind the text, the world of the text, and the world in front of the text were carefully explored, deepening our understanding of a people who encountered God, were called by God again and again, and who sought to discern God's presence, direction and calling on their lives.

Reader:

You taught us interpretation skills, pointed us to resources to help us in that regard, and encouraged us to peel apart layers of structural analysis, source and redaction criticism, and comparisons between translations.

We learned how our own social locations were lenses through which we read and understood scripture and how to hear the voices of those outside of our own context to bring a more rich hermeneutic to our work in ministry.

St Minister: Through Christianity & the Arts, you taught us not only how to appreciate art, but to see the assumptions, gifts and biases therein. You inspired us by drawing out our creativity, encouraging us to grasp at wonder and awe to help bring a different spark of life to worship and other contextual ministries.

Reader: From you, we learned to see and listen closely to the marginalized and unnamed in scripture and to not only consider, but attempt to amplify their voices, giving them a chance to be seen and heard, their stories helping clarify our own and those around us.

Presider: Dr. Thayer, with you, students traveled millennia back to their Christian roots, tracing the steps and missteps of our ancient kin as they worked to compose how Christian faith is lived and practiced. You helped students hear the voices of bishops, councils, martyrs, monks, nuns, mystics, ascetics, reformers, preachers, and layfolk. You helped students to see their struggles of these forebears as they worked to make sense of faith and develop doctrine on which they could stand firm, with hopes of helping others do the same.

St Minister: We learned how the church at times became an oppressor, enforcing belief through violence, and at other times, through peaceful disagreement and separation. Our hope is now to learn from each other's faith perspective and become holy peacemakers, not creators of division. At every turn, you helped us bridge the ancient with the contemporary, helping us to see parallels between church history and tradition and our modern-day religious events and controversies. In that sense, there is nothing new under the sun, but different ways of wrestling with faith and what it means to practice it well.

Reader:

Using the writings and wisdom of our ancestor seekers of God, you helped us follow in their spiritual footsteps, trying on their practices like cloaks of mystery, both enshrouding and revealing pathways of communion with God. We journaled together, prayed together in many different forms, and walked a labyrinth, weaving together our desires to know and be known by God, leaving each class in wonder that God can meet us in all of our diversities.

All:

Your teaching and guidance live on in our own vocations, they have left an indelible mark of incredible intellectual and creative wonder on our very souls. We recognize the great passion, consideration and care you have poured into your work, speaking your wisdom in many forms, your teaching echoing through the halls of this place from the past and well into the future. And we recognize we have been marked by the Christ-like love and support you have given us as we journeyed with you. You not only taught us through your words, but through your actions, that our lives and our passions mattered to you. And because of that, not only did we learn the subject matter well, we grew in our connections with God, with you, and with each other. We are so very grateful for you, our teachers and our friends. Thank you for the patience you gave us as we wrestled, grew and learned. Thanks be to God for your faithfulness!

Presider:

And so, we come to this day, the last chapel of our 2023-2024 school year, to give you both honor and heartfelt congratulations on the occasion of your retirements from this esteemed seminary.
